► Epiphany:

The manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles (all non-Jews) as represented by the Magi.

The festival commemorating the Epiphany on January 6. A manifestation of a divine or supernatural being.

A moment of sudden revelation or insight.

A lot has changed, yet not much has. We are in a new year now. We have passed through Advent in waiting for the coming of Christ, which brings change, and through the Christmas Season, which was the culminating of our wait with the birth of the Son of God who took upon Him, the flesh of a human, Jesus, who walked the earth over 2,000 years ago.

We are now in the time of Epiphany. The wise men are coming and King Herod is feeling threatened by the babe, Jesus, who was born a king. It may be the change that Herod is fearful of. Oh, sure, he sees a king as a direct threat to his rule, which means he is no longer in charge; he may lose everything. What he does not realize is this change will happen, one way or another. Also, it is not about losing everything, but about gaining everything, in Jesus Christ.

The arrival of God on the scene in Jesus of Nazareth, tells us that what the prophets foretold has come true. It is difficult, if not impossible, for some to see. What Jesus does, is not the norm of the day and not the kind of

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Messiah that the Jews are looking for. They fail to see that Jesusø actions, although completely opposite of what they are expecting, are more powerful, more disrupting than any fire and brimstone that could be thrown down.



We have the benefit of hindsight; let us use it then. Our hope is in Jesus. Our lives are in His hands. How we respond to God, to one another, as Christians, is grounded in the Love of God in Jesus Christ. We are grounded by responding to God and one another, as

Jesus told us. In Matthew, chapter 22, Jesus tells us the greatest commandments to help us to live our lives by. He says, õí Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.ø ³⁸ This is the first and greatest commandment. ³⁹ And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.ø ⁴⁰ All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments.ö (Mt 22:37-40 NIV)

At council in November, we adopted a covenant on how to deal with conflicts and complaints. Each council member, which includes myself, are expected to sign the covenant to be able to serve. This covenant has been signed by the staff and will be signed by all who are in leadership positions in the church. Copies of this covenant are available in our welcoming area, in the church office and in this newsletter. This is the commitment by all the leadership towards a change in how conflict and disagreements are handled.

The first and most important part of the document are the words of Jesus from Matthew: ¹⁵ õIf another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If the member listens to you, you have regained that one. ¹⁶ But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. (Mt 18:15-16 NRSV)

If you recall my first day here, October 16, I said that I have an open-door policy. If you have a problem with something I have done or am doing, you need to come speak with me so we can resolve it. It is not acceptable for any of us to go to another and speak about issues we may have with someone else. We must, if we are going to become and stay healthy, follow Jesusø words. We must engage one another in healthy, productive (cont. after flower page)

ways. Anonymous letters, email complaints, Facebook messages of complaints etc., are not acceptable ways to deal with issues. We must do this face to face. We do not always have to agree about issues, but we do need to work through them and come to an understanding.

When we follow what Jesus says about the greatest commandments, it will be natural to want to speak with our sisters and brothers in Christ instead of speaking about them. When we follow the words of Jesus and work though our conflicts and complaints, then we can use the experience to grow in our relationship with God and each other.

Although the council and myself are not asking the members to sign off on the covenant, I would ask that you read it and take it to heart. There are many opportunities that await us here at First Lutheran. We can do much with the help of God in mission to the community and the world. The devil, however, uses conflict, when not handled properly, to attempt to destroy what God has created. The devil will attempt to use conflict as an opportunity to prevent us from reaching out to the community so that all may experience the love of God in Christ Jesus, for all of World.

God, I ask that through your divine being, Your Son, revealed in the flesh, brings on a sudden revelation for us all. That we can commit to change, commit to a healthy relationship with you and with all our sisters and brothers. I ask that through this we see and partake in all the opportunities of ministry that you will bless us with. All of this I ask in your Sonøs name, Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior.



- •to experience ways to deepen and strengthen your personal prayer life
- •to explore how we can engage with others in prayerful ways

How to Deal with Conflict and Complaints

You are an elected or volunteer leader in your congregation or hold a staff position. As a leader you may be in a position to hear complaints or be aware of conflict. If someone comes to you and says, "You are on the council (board or committee). I need to talk to you about this problem, concern, issue or situation." What do you do? Consider these steps.

- 1. Follow Matthew 18: 15 "If another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If the member listens to you, you have regained that one. But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses.
- 2. Be careful about addressing complaints through email that can be quickly forwarded. Consider responding with a short note that lets the sender know you've received the message and an invitation to meet to talk about it face-to-face.
- 3. Listen to the whole story. Be a good and careful listener.
- 4. Say "I'm sorry," about the problem. "I'm sorry you felt hurt." Be empathetic, sympathetic but don't take sides. Remain neutral.
- 5. Ask questions to gain more understanding. Look for areas of agreement.
- 6. Wonder and ask about possible solutions to the problem. Try to imagine "win/win" solutions. Keep Jesus in the conversation.
- 7. Remember that the purpose of the church is to participate in God's mission to redeem the world. Keep Jesus in the center of every conversation. Don't be a afraid to say, "I wonder what Jesus would do/"
- 8. Let them know that this is the council policy. No anonymous complaints will be forward. Anonymous letters are kept on file but not read at council meetings. Only signed letters will be read. The phrases like "a lot of people are saying," or "everybody thinks" are manipulative and not accepted. Individuals can only state their own feelings or opinions.
- 9. Do not gossip about the matter. Do not form a triangle by talking to others about the problem. Encourage direct face-to-face communication between the conflicted individuals. Instruct folks to deal directly with the board or individual. If that is not possible, instruct the person to talk to the personnel committee. If there isn't a personnel committee then talk to the church council president.
