As we contemplate and reflect upon our need for Jesusø death, during the time of Lent, when our days are short and the weather is cold, we know the rest of the story to look forward to. 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can be difficult to come to the other side, as we wait for Spring.

It is in the focus and reflection upon our need for Jesus and our dependence upon Jesus that keeps us grounded in an artificial depression built upon hope of the Son. In hope of the resurrection where the Light of the world shines for us.

For our congregation this year, our Lent will be a little different. We will be focused upon what God has given us, our bodies. We will be focused upon being in community to support each other during Lent, during the end of Winter, during longing for warm weather, longer days and shorter nights. God gave us Jesus, and the hope of Easter, but God also gives us to each other.

In giving each of us to each other, we exist with each other through our physical bodies. We can only be with each other and care for each other if we also take care of our bodies. As you read the Daniel Plan book, watch the DVDøs and listen to the sermons, you will see how important our bodies are. When the body is not functioning properly, then other aspects of our life with God suffer.

Jesusøbody suffered and eventually he died. It is in his death that we receive our reconciliation. It is that reconciliation from our sins, we can also focus upon. It is that reconciliation that we can move forward to carry out what God is calling each of us to do. We can however, only do this if we take care of our bodies. It is then we can start to live up to what God intended for us.

Now that we are in Lent, I invite you to reflect upon what God is calling you and us to do. We can reflect upon the gift that God has given us in Jesus Christ and the expectations that God has for us in what God calls us to do. Being part of the Body of Christ here on earth means we need to take care of ourselves to fulfill this. Taking care of the body, mind and spirit.

This Lent, in your reflection time, we will be taking on new habits and giving up old habits. As part of that focus and reflection time, I will also be leaving out at the welcome center, a reading challenge. Starting on Monday, February 27, I invite you to start reading the New Testament, before Easter day. There will be a guided reading plan to assist you on this.

I am officially starting up a Prayer Shawl/Adult Baptism Shawl Ministry.

History of the Prayer Shawl:

Over the centuries, shawls have come to symbolize shelter, peace and spiritual sustenance. Since the inception of the Prayer Shawl Ministry in 1998, the members of this organization have lovingly donated their time and talents by creating hand knitted and crocheted shawls, filled with the power of prayer for those in need.

The blessing of the Prayer Shawl provides healing and comfort to the sick, the lonely and the elderly. Like all acts of generosity, the presentation of a Prayer Shawl enriches the giver as well as the recipient.

I would like to invite people to participate in creating a Prayer Shawl. We would, with your help, begin this new ministry at First Lutheran. This can be done in a group setting as well as in the comfort of your own home.

The Prayer Shawl begins with prayers and blessings for the recipient. The intentions are continued throughout the creation of the shawl. Upon completion, shawls can be used for: patients when given a difficult diagnosis; when undergoing medical procedures; as a comfort after a loss or in times of stress; during bereavement; for prayer or meditation. Recipients need not be a member to receive one.

If you would like a pattern (knitting or crocheting), I would love to share them with you. Copies will also be available in the office.

I would like the group or groups to meet once a month.

When monetary donations are received, we are able to buy food from the Food Bank of Siouxland dramatically cheaper than from the grocery store. No money comes out of the general fund for our pantry; everything is done through donations specifically designated for the food pantry.
