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

To Be Church Pastor Doug

What is it to be church, to be gathered as Christian believers, in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord? That is a tall question to answer, and the Apostles struggled with this as well. If you recall this season of Easter, there were many readings from Acts, and many recounted struggles of giving up one's self to the other. It did not mean losing one's identity, but taking on another identity as a disciple of Christ. This means not mine, not I, not me but instead WE, US and OUR(s) (not possessive but plural, as the Body of Christ), as our identity.

This congregation is God's and WE belong to it. WE belong to serve others, not to be served. When each of US respond to God in this new identity, WE truly incorporate what God has given to be all of OUR(s), those that reside as "members" and those who are served by US as fellow disciples of Jesus.

This means that the monies that I donate are not mine, but OUR(s). This means the committees of the congregation are part of each of US. The ministries that WE offer are for the benefit of all. Not some, not one, not just you, not just me, but US, WE and OUR(s). The WE includes not just members, but all of God's children. WE are called to love OUR(s) neighbor as WE were first loved by God. We are bound together as the Body of Christ for the service in the Body into the world.

WE have been called together in this congregation to love and support each of US. Not some but all. Not the ones that fit into our mold, our comfort zone, but the ones that do not fit into our mold. The ones that are outside OUR(s) comfort zone.

This new identity was difficult for the early Christian church. Paul's letters continually reminded the early churches of what it meant to be this new identity of not about one's self but about the WE, US, OUR(s) mentality that Christ Himself came to US in.

You have heard me say it, and I truly have meant and continue to mean, that WE are stronger in OUR(s) differences than in what WE have in common. It is OUR(s) differences that provide unbreakable bonds forged by Christ, for OUR(s) sake. It is OUR(s) call to stand up for the WE, US and OUR(s) and call out what is wrong and lead others, both inside and outside of this congregation, into the "Opening Doors to Faith".

Here are some Readings for you to consider, as WE go about living in the WE, US and OUR(s) of congregational life: Ephesians 4:17-35; Romans 7:4-6; 1 Corinthians 12:27-31; Ephesians 4:11-16. To see the struggles of being church, look at Romans Chapter 2; all of 1 Corinthians; Galatians (Martin Luther's foundation of his theology); and other books of Paul and the book of Acts.

What is Lab?

I hope you continue to read on, because this is very important stuff, especially considering the call I have here by God, in this congregation. In the ministry site profile (MSP) of First Lutheran and thus, as part of my call paper work, I was asked to lead this congregation into four things.

1. To rebuild our congregation
2. To attract more young families
3. To create harmony within the church
4. To keep our youth as active members after the completion of confirmation.

Under Energy in the MSP, it stated: We are very passionate about finding a new shepherd that will provide us long term stability and harmony.

What does this all have to do with Leadership Lab? I want to take this opportunity to clear up some misconceptions about what Leadership Lab

is, who it is for, and how a congregation can benefit from those that attend lab.

Leadership Lab is for those youth entering High School and young adults in College. It is also for adults who are seeking training in becoming an effective youth leader. Regarding the youth and young adults: this is a seven-year learning process of becoming leaders in the church and the community. Learning how to lead worship, Bible studies, self-reflection, reflection of God's call for them in the Christian church and in the world of God's people. That was a mouthful, and that is why it takes seven years. Each day of lab focuses on worship, large group activities and small group activities, all centered around what I just laid out. The experience can be, and is, life-changing. Just ask Lucas Fader, Adam Durant, Sara Diew and Jayden Grove, who all went last year. Leadership Lab is the home of the "Butterfly People" because of the transformation that each youth, young adult and leader goes through while being at Leadership Lab.

For the adults who attend, there is a two-year course of adult lab, specifically aimed at training youth leaders. This course will take a non-trained lay leader and give them the tools to help lead the youth in the church. Even if someone has been doing youth leadership, this will give additional tools and help hone their skills.

Again, what does all of this have to do with the MSP goals? To rebuild the congregation, it needs to be done from the ground up. This takes time and investment. It takes no time to tear something down but takes considerable effort to build back up. The building will come through youth involvement, giving them ownership in dis-

cipleship through First Lutheran. There are other opportunities to serve in the community, and youth will seek those, if not given direction here first. MSP points 1 and 4 are dependent upon youth being trained and given opportunities to lead.

When MSP points 1 and 4 are worked upon, then point 2 becomes a reality as younger families want to be engaged in a place where the youth are valued and their own youth can flourish in an environment that encourages the youth to be leaders.

Ultimately MSP point 3 is filled all along the way when we support the youth and their leaders. Let me speak more to the lay leaders of the youth. If we are truly serious about MSP points 1, 2, and 4, then as a congregation we MUST support the lay leaders who want to work with the youth. Right now, they are paying for the training out of their pocket, but if we are invested in this congregation, if we are invested in the call that God has for this congregation, then the natural outgrowth would be to invest in the leaders of the future leaders.

Please note that Leadership Lab does not replace confirmation camp or any camping opportunities. Leadership Lab is not camping, it is building up the body of Christ, through leadership in the church. Confirmation camp is for the middle school youth who are currently enrolled in confirmation. If you have questions about Leadership Lab, ask Kris Dill or myself; we are the ones that can give you accurate information about what Lab has to offer this congregation and the Christian church.

Should you feel called to support the goals as outlined in the MSP and any of the youth eligible to attend Leadership Lab or its adult leaders, consider donating to their Leadership Lab fund. You can mark this on a check as Leadership Lab or a specific person. You can also do this through our website under donations. <http://www.flcsc.org>

Church Killers

Those who are familiar with what is known as the “Seven Last Words”. Even though they are more than seven words, they represent the seven times that Jesus spoke before he died.

Whenever I have been involved throughout the Church (ELCA) in discussions about change to better do the mission God calls us to do, we often refer to the seven last words of a church before it dies: **“WE NEVER DID IT THAT WAY BEFORE.”**

Unwillingness to change the way we do things excludes us from reaching out in different ways to impact others with the Good News of Jesus. The message never changes, but the way it is presented needs to change so that others can hear. The New Testament was written in the Greek Language, yet the church led by the Spirit realized that people needed to share the news in the language of the people so that they could hear the message. How many of you would worship if the language was in Greek?

When change does not happen, a Church Killer emerges.

A second Church Killer is the Rumor Mill. Rumors are the most lethal communication

that takes place within a congregation. Rumors usually start when someone is unhappy. The Congregation can never be perfect because we are sinners and no matter how we try, sin never leaves. So rumors are always going to happen. However, rumors that are left unchecked and unchallenged are killers. Unchecked, unchallenged rumors can drive people away from being in worship and cause them to seek other congregations where they can feel safer. Unchecked, unchallenged rumors can cause despair in a congregation’s staff and leadership. A high percentage of pastors and staff leave, not because they want to, but because they can’t emotionally withstand the attacks from rumors.

So what we do? Here is a four step process to which we should commit ourselves in order to bring more health and vitality to our congregation. If someone shares with you a rumor, you can take action.

STEP 1: Ask the person sharing the rumor how they came about getting that information.

STEP 2: Before you share that story, check out the truth of it with the person about whom the rumor is said.

STEP 3: If the story turns out to be true, ask yourself if sharing that rumor would be helpful to the person about whom the rumor is said.

STEP 4: Before you pass on the story, even if it is true, ask how it is going to make First Lutheran a more loving congregation?

Perhaps the best phrase to remember is, **“SPEAK THE TRUTH IN LOVE.”**

less and when we do wrong, Jesus gives us hope, love and forgiveness.

Gaslighting: Know It, Identify It, and Protect Yourself

Gaslighting is a tactic in which a person or entity, in order to gain more power, makes a victim question their reality. It works much better than you may think. Anyone is susceptible to gas-

lighting, and it is a common technique of abusers, dictators, narcissists, and cult leaders. It is done slowly, so the victim doesn't realize how much they've been brainwashed. For example, in the movie *Gaslight* (1944), a man manipulates his wife to the point where she thinks she is losing her mind.

People who gaslight typically use the following techniques:

1. They tell blatant lies.

You know it's an outright lie. Yet they are telling you this lie with a straight face. Why are they so blatant? Because they're setting up a precedent. Once they tell you a huge lie, you're not sure if anything they say is true. Keeping you unsteady and off-kilter is the goal.

2. They deny they ever said something, even though you have proof.

You know they said they would do something; you know you heard it. But they out and out deny it. It makes you start questioning your reality—maybe they never said that thing. And the more they do this, the more you question your reality and start accepting theirs.

3. They use what is near and dear to you as ammunition.

They know how important your kids are to you, and they know how important your identity is to you. So those may be one of the first things they attack. If you have kids, they tell you that you should not have had those children. They will tell you you'd be a worthy person if only you didn't have a long

list of negative traits. They attack the foundation of your being.

4. They wear you down over time.

This is one of the insidious things about gaslighting—it is done gradually, over time. A lie here, a lie there, a snide comment every so often, and then it starts ramping up. Even the brightest, most self-aware people can be sucked into gaslighting—it is that effective. It's the "frog in the frying pan" analogy: The heat is turned up slowly, so the frog never realizes what's happening to it.

5. Their actions do not match their words.

When dealing with a person or entity that gaslights, look at what they are doing rather than what they are saying. What they are saying means nothing; it is just talk. What they are doing is the issue.

6. They throw in positive reinforcement to confuse you.

This person or entity that is cutting you down, telling you that you don't have value, is now praising you for something you did. This adds an additional sense of uneasiness. You think, "Well maybe they aren't so bad." Yes, they are. This is a calculated attempt to keep you off-kilter—and again, to question your reality. Also look at what you were praised for; it is probably something that served the gaslighter.

7. They know confusion weakens people.

Gaslighters know that people like having a sense of stability and normalcy. Their goal is to uproot this and make you constantly question everything. And humans' natural tendency is to look to the person or entity that will help you feel more stable—and that happens to be the gaslighter.

8. They project.

They are a drug user or a cheater, yet they are constantly accusing you of that. This is done so often that you start trying to defend yourself, and are distracted from the gaslighter's own behavior.

9. They try to align people against you.

Gaslighters are masters at manipulating and finding the people they know will stand by them no matter what—and they use these people against you. They will make comments such as, "This person knows that you're not right," or "This person knows you're useless too." Keep in mind it does not mean that these people actually said these things. A gaslighter is a constant liar. When the gaslighter uses this tactic it makes you feel like you don't know who to trust or turn to—and that leads you right back to the gaslighter. And that's exactly what they want: Isolation gives them more control.

10. They tell you or others that you are crazy.

This is one of the most effective tools of the gaslighter, because it's dismissive. The gaslighter knows if they question your sanity, people will not believe you when you tell them the gaslighter is abusive or out-of-control. It's a master technique.

11. They tell you everyone else is a liar.

By telling you that everyone else (your family, the media) is a liar, it again makes you question your reality. You've never known someone with the audacity to do this, so they must be telling the truth, right? No. It's a manipulation technique. It makes people turn to the

gaslighter for the “correct” information—which isn’t correct information at all.

The more you are aware of these techniques, the quicker you can identify them and avoid falling into the gaslighter’s trap.

Caring for God's Gifts

What does it mean to care for the gifts of God? First, we need to understand a few things that help us to grasp the magnitude of what God asks us to do. First and foremost, we need to grasp, more than through head knowledge but as part of our being, who created all.

God is the author of human life; when God created Adam and Eve, Genesis 1:26-27, God created the first family and gave them dominion over all that God had created on earth: fish, birds, cattle and wild animals of earth. To have dominion is to rule, and a ruler is supposed to do what is best for those things they have rule over. A ruler oversees all that they rule over.

We know that God created all that we see; we read Genesis 1 and 2 to see that. We can also see who

created, and who the actual owner is, in Psalm 24:1-2 and Psalm 89:11. Humans are given the dominion/rule/oversees the things that God created. These are not gifted to us but given to rule over. In giving, humans rule over what God has created, God attaches a string to rule. Even the gifting from God does not turn over the ownership of ruling nor the ownership of those things to rule over.

As Christians we have a basis of understanding Jesus as the Son of God, through the Old Testament. As Christians we understand that the Son is God, one person of the Trinity and Jesus Christ, as the incarnate of God, the Son. If that is not enough to understand that Jesus is also the owner of all, then Jesus tells us so. From John 16:15: "All that belongs to the Father is mine. That is why I said the Spirit will receive from me what he will make known to you."

To understand what God wants us to do with what God owns, Paul tells us in 1 Corinthians 4:1-2 that we are servants of Christ and that we are entrusted with what God has revealed. We are also told that we are required, because of the trust we have been given, to be faithful with what we have been entrusted with.

To understand what God wants us to do, with what God owns, 1 Peter 4:10, says: "Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms." Christians are stewards of God's creation for the benefit of God and God's creation. We own nothing, since all comes from God and we are stewards of what God has created. In other words, we do not own any property, family, money,

etc. that we may believe to be “ours”, because it is not. It is owned by God for God and God’s creation, which includes all of humanity and the world.

We receive warnings to heed about stewardship over what belongs to God. In 1 Timothy 6:17-19 it says, ¹⁷ Command those who are rich in this present world not to be arrogant nor to put their hope in wealth, which is so uncertain, but to put their hope in God, who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment. ¹⁸ Command them to do good, to be rich in good deeds, and to be generous and willing to share. ¹⁹ In this way they will lay up treasure for themselves as a firm foundation for the coming age, so that they may take hold of the life that is truly life. There are warnings about what treasures and money can do to us. See Matthew 6:24 and Luke 12:34.

First Lutheran is not ours to own, but entrusted to us as stewards. The things we “own” we are only stewards of. The treasures, money, abilities, all that God has entrusted to us, are to be used for all of God’s people. What mission and ministry can you get behind with your stewardship to support for God’s people? Where can you step out with what has been entrusted to you get move from “I” towards Christ? Let me leave you with what Max Lucado said in his daily devotional.

What’s the cure for selfishness? A smaller “i” and a greater Christ! Don’t focus on yourself; focus on all that you have in Christ—the encouragement in Christ, the fellowship of the Spirit, the affection and compassion of heaven!
