

## **Being a Healthy Church**

We all learn over time how to identify when we are healthy and when we are not. We often don't think in the same terms of whether a church is healthy or not. Signs of a healthy Church include vibrant spirituality, deep commitment to mission, and healthy relationships with one another.

Healthy relationship among the disciples of Jesus gathered as a congregation is vital for a church to thrive as a healthy congregation. Conflict is always present in any human group. Conflict itself

is not a disease. Unresolved conflict leads to disease—anger, hatred, revenge. This disease threatens to kill congregations.

We all know that Jesus is a healer. So it is not strange for Jesus to offer healing advice to remedy the disease of unresolved conflict. Just like in the ailments that afflict our bodies, early intervention can avoid the possibility of unresolved conflict. Here are Jesus' words from Matthew 18:15-17: "If another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If the member listens to you, you have regained that one. <sup>16</sup>But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. <sup>17</sup>If the member refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax-collector."

That sounds like a simple three-step process. But as we all know, resolving conflict is anything but easy.

Step 1: When there is a problem, talk to the person with whom there is that problem. Don't complain about it to your friends. Talk to the person first. Then no one else will know and it will not become part of the rumor mill.

Step 2 If the problem isn't resolved, ask two or three people to go with you, not to gang-up, but to act as witnesses who can verify that you attempted to resolve the problem.

Step 3: Ask the Congregation Council for help. The Council will then ask a mediator, again with two witnesses, to try and resolve the problem between the two parties.

We all know that our human natures being what they are, these three steps may not solve the problem. So what do we do? Jesus says to treat them like tax collectors or unbelievers. For the people of Jesus' day that would be to treat the person who refuses to make peace as an outcast. But how did Jesus treat tax collectors and unbelievers? As people in need of God's love. We as the Church continue to love them with the love of Christ. For how long? FOREVER.

#### **Teams**

Teams work together to achieve a common goal. Teams look to maximize the strengths of the team members, to achieve the best possible outcome. Sometimes teams change members, as the needs arise. No single individual is more valuable than another on a team. The team survives and thrives by working unified for the common goal. The apostle Paul is well known for describing the Christian church like a body. The body is a team. Each member having its own functions, but none could take on the part of another. Each part is useful, and each are dependent.

"<sup>11</sup>So Christ himself gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the pastors and teachers, <sup>12</sup> to equip his people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up <sup>13</sup> until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ." (Eph 4:11 -13 NIV)

<sup>16</sup> From him [Jesus] the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament,

grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work. (Eph 4:16 NIV) 12 Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ. <sup>13</sup> For we were all baptized by one Spirit so as to form one body—whether Jews or Gentiles, slave or free—and we were all given the one Spirit to drink. <sup>14</sup> Even so the body is not made up of one part but of many. (1 Co 12:12 -14 NIV) <sup>21</sup> The eye cannot say to the hand, "I don't need you!" And the head cannot say to the feet, "I don't need you!" 22 On the contrary, those parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, <sup>23</sup> and the parts that we think are less honorable we treat with special honor. (1 Cor. 12:21-23 NIV)

What does this all have to do with teams? At the July council meeting, the council passed a continuing resolution to the constitution in relation to the bylaws of First Lutheran. All committees will be renamed to teams. In keeping with the team function and the body functioning in the team, the teams will be empowered to act based upon their mission statements to carry out their actions in accordance to those mission statements and within their budgets, without the burden of coming to the council for approval of activities. This means that they are free to follow the calling of God, without interference. This should help streamline the process of getting mission done.

What does this mean for each of you? It means opportunity. Have you been on a committee, but felt you got nowhere because of all the hoops your committee had to leap

through? Teams can form as a team is needed. Teams inside of teams can form. For example: You may have a passion for Advent/Christmas music. Maybe you know a few people that have that passion. Then the Worship and Music team can form a sub-team to work on Advent/ Christmas music for the seasons. When that planning is done, the team can move on until it may be formed again next year.

Christian Education team is a good example.

Many things fall under Christian Education. Vacation Bible School, Sunday School and adult education. What about a team specifically for VBS?

That was done this year. Their responsibility was to put on the best possible VBS they could. Learn from the good and bad and pass the knowledge down for the next time the team is formed.

There are many possibilities waiting for your passion. What passion can fill a spot on a team at First Lutheran? Not sure, come and speak with a council member. Come and speak with the pastor. Don't wait to be invited, just step out of the boat, you too can walk on water with a team of people to assist.

## The Power of Money

# Meditation by Father Richard Rohr Center for Action and Meditation

Money is not a product of nature. Money doesn't grow on trees. Money is an invention...a fabrication. Money still facilitates the sharing and exchange of goods and services, but somewhere along the way the power we gave money outstripped its original utilitarian role.

We have made money more important than we are, given it more meaning than human life. Humans have done, and will do, terrible things in the name of money. They have killed for it, enslaved other people for it, and enslaved themselves to joyless lives in pursuit of it.

For most of us, this relationship with money is a deeply conflicted one, and our behavior with and around money is often at odds with our most deeply held values, commitments, and ideals—what I call our soul. I believe that under it all what deeply matters to human beings, our most universal soulful commitments and core values, is the well-being of the people we love, ourselves, and the world in which we live.

We really do want a world that works for everyone. We don't want children to go hungry. We don't want violence and war to plague the planet. We don't want torture and revenge and retribution to be instruments of government and leadership. Everyone wants a safe, secure, loving, nourishing life for themselves and the ones they love and really for everyone. I also believe that under their fears and upsets, even the deepest ones, everyone wants to love and be loved, and make a difference with their lives. I believe people also want an experience of their own divinity, their own connectedness with all life and the mystery of something greater than we comprehend.

Each of us experiences a lifelong tug-of-war between our money interests and the calling of our soul. When we're in the domain of soul, we act with integrity. We are thoughtful and generous, allowing, courageous, and committed. We are open, vulnerable, and heartful. We are trustworthy and trusting of others. We feel at peace within ourselves and confident that we are an integral part of a larger, more universal experience, something greater than ourselves.
