

## It's All About the Love Pastor Doug

Jesus says, <sup>34</sup> I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. <sup>35</sup> By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

Loving is all the time, not when love suits us best. Loving is leading with love first, not our agenda first. Loving is shedding our old self, for a new self. Loving is to die to the old self and be resurrected new, in love.

To die to the old self, we must also repent of our old ways. We cannot love without repentance. Being repentant prepares our hearts and minds to be open to the Holy Spirit for change. Being repentant is the start of what Paul tells us to be like.

<sup>3</sup> Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. <sup>4</sup> Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. <sup>5</sup> Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus,

Therefore, my sisters and brothers, we must change and be resurrected so that we can carry out the mission of First Lutheran, "Loving others in Christ for outreach to all; while providing for God's diversity."

There are three key words in this mission statement. **Love**, following the commandment that Christ Jesus gave us. **All**, which does not mean some, or the many, or those that conform, or any other stipulation. It means ALL. **Diversity**, which is another way of saying ALL. All of God's

people come in a variety of unique characteristics that do not conform with each other. We were created unique. Our uniqueness means we are diverse. In our diverseness, we all hear God in our own ways, at our times, and worship differently than each other. It means we do not dress alike or look alike.

Now we go back to Love, which is what it is all about. It is also what God is, "for God is love." Jesus and the Apostle John tell us to love one another.

<sup>7</sup> Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God.
<sup>8</sup> Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. <sup>9</sup> God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him.

Note the harsh reality in 1 John 4:8a, <sup>8</sup> Whoever does not love does not know God... Love one another, if not because we are all children of God, then do so because you feel compelled by your own self-conviction to respond to the Love of God, revealed to you in Jesus Christ our Lord. Love one another, so that we might live in the reality of God's love for us. Be resurrected in love

#### Reflections

By Gary Panko

This year is a special year for me. I will be celebrating my 45<sup>th</sup> year of ordained ministry. It has been quite a ride—ups and downs, joys and sorrows, conflict and peace. And in the end, all I can do is thank God for the call to serve, the learning that has been given me, and the love that I have shared in God's name.

In the three years I have been a member of First Lutheran, it has been a learning experience of how to serve in ways other than be a pastoral leader. I have found many joys and challenges. The greatest learning curve has been to speak as a member of the body of Christ and not as the leader.

I hope you all know how much I care about our community of faith. God has gifted us in so many ways. God has called us to an ambitious mission of sharing God's love in our community and to the ends of the earth.

One way I hope I can be helpful is to share some of the wisdom from my experience. Here is one thing I would like to share to enhance our Sunday morning experience.

For a pastor, Sunday morning is a stressful time, not necessarily in a bad way, but in a time-sensitive way. There are always last minute details to attend to. There are always things that are not working as planned. There are even last minute changes to be made. There is a great need to pray for the power of the Spirit to be moving like the wind through worship. So one of the things we can do is to not interrupt the pastor with things that can be handled at a different time.

Leading worship is not like any other activity—it is holistic—body, mind and spirit. Greeting people after worship is not just a friendly thing—it is a time of personally sharing a spiritual bond as we do in the sharing of peace. If you have a need to speak to the pastor about something simply mention you would like to speak to him after he has greeted all people. Pastors respect privacy and so would rather visit individually, rather than in front of others. It is part of giving our best to God.

Our drive-in worship services start again on June 9 at 10:30 and continue through September. This year, the outdoor worship services will be held on the second and fourth Sundays of the month, weather permitting. Holy Communion will be served, and the services will be live streamed, as well.

Social Ministry collects "Pantry" items each month to donate to the needs of our community. The Pantry items collected for May will be food items for families in need. Also being collected are toiletries and household cleaning supplies for the Council on Sexual Assault and Domestic Violence. Please leave your donations in the cart in the entryway.

### **Resurrecting, Welcoming**

On Saturday, April 20, a whole host of disciples descended upon the sanctuary to provide for changes to make the sanctuary a more welcoming place to all. Keeping with our mission statement of, "Loving others in Christ for outreach to all; while providing for God's diversity", multiple changes were made. A special thanks to our Boy Scouts who showed up and helped out.

Most churches today that are being built or renovated look for a way to provide an atmosphere that is mindful of Scripture, Reverence towards God Tradition, to reach the unchurched or underchurched (ones who have left organized religion). The changes done, the council believes, will bring about the changes needed for resurrection at First Lutheran, carrying us into the 21<sup>st</sup> century of worship.

In response to those who could not reach the communion rail to take communion due to the nature of the location, a new rail was installed. An offset color carpeting was installed in place of the old rail, to be symbolic of the traditional rail that had been in place. A new communion rail was installed. This rail is flexible and can be put in place and be removed as necessary, for such things as musical performances, VBS plays and Christmas plays.

If we have communion at the rail, the ushers will dismiss from the pews in the same manner as we did with flow through of two lines. Each side of the sanctuary will go to the rail and divide from the center of the rail, towards the side they were dismissed from. After receiving the Body and Blood of Christ, they can then exit in their own timing, towards the outside of the sanctuary and go back to the pews.

The old railing was removed, and it is stored in the basement. By the removal of the rail, this opened up space for an altar table. As you may have seen, the altar built into the wall remains in place and is used. The Eucharist is first placed there and moved to the table in preparation for the words of institution and distribution.

The altar table now allows for the leader to lead by facing the congregation. A Roman Catholic tradition is to face away from the congregation, making this a vertical prayer when leading prayers and when speaking the words of institution. With the introduction of the altar table, there is flexibility on how to lead. This also does not put a focus point on the leader/pastor as the one to carry and lift prayers to God. We the body of Christ are the ministers (priesthood of all believers), keeping with Lutheran tradition and all can participate in the worship service.

The priesthood of all believers has no qualification on race, age or sex. Making a holy space to be welcomed into and participate in the worship, the "Pray Ground" was created. The Pray Ground is not a new concept but has been brought into many ELCA congregations and other denominations as well. The first three pews along the pulpit/lectern side were removed to make this sacred space. The families with children are welcomed into a space that allows them to worship, not excluded from the congregation, but within the rest of the congregation as a community of believers in the body of Christ. Children are given a space they can call their own. They have a place where they can see and hear what is going on in worship. They tend to be guieter when they can see and hear what is going on in worship. They learn from other children the appropriate behaviors during worship. They learn to be in worship by being in and part of worship.

The lectern was removed and now what was the pulpit will serve in both capacities, in many cases. A lectern, according to the Oxford dictionary is, "A tall stand with a sloping top to hold a book or

notes, from which someone, typically a preacher or lecturer, can read while standing up." Its origin is from the medieval Latin lectrum, from legere 'to read". (https://

en.oxforddictionaries.com/definition/lectern) A pulpit, according to the Oxford dictionary is, "A raised enclosed platform in a church or chapel from which the preacher delivers a sermon." Its origin is from Latin pulpitum 'scaffold, platform', in medieval Latin 'pulpit'. (https://

en.oxforddictionaries.com/definition/pulpit) The pulpit will now serve as a lectern and the lectern will serve as a pulpit, since the structure can serve both needs and is designed as such to fit both needs. Some of the space used by the lectern removal was used to provide space for the communion rail and the band.

With the removal of the lectern, the band was given an additional two feet of space. The space was important for a couple of reasons. The lectern structure no longer blocks the band from leading the congregation in the service. There is a little more space for them to be able to comfortably move and lead. There will be a reconfiguration of where instruments and band members are placed to assist in leading more effectively. The band area also had a small covering wall placed in front to help hide some of the microphone cords, music cords and monitors used by the band in leading worship.

First Lutheran's sanctuary has been resurrected into the 21<sup>st</sup> century of worship of our risen Lord. Through this we welcome not only those that are worshiping today but those who want to worship tomorrow. God gives us all a mission to reach the least, last and the lost. This newly resurrected welcoming space can provide for some of that. Now it is up to us, the disciples of Jesus the Christ, to welcome guests, friends and members alike, into this space. Get the word out. Go invite. Tell them the good news of Jesus Christ and where they can hear the Gospel, First Lutheran at 8:15 am, 10:30 am both in person and online!
