



## Confession Pastor Doug

When you hear confession, what comes to your mind? Does confession invoke you to reflect upon your sins? Or does it invoke you to think about speaking the truth of our Lord Jesus? Is a confession about truth? A confession is about speaking a truth, but it is not limited to sins. When we say the Apostles' Creed, Nicene Creed and Athanasian Creed, these are all confessions of faith. We will concentrate today on the confession of sins.

This passage from 1 John may sound familiar. "<sup>9</sup> If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness. <sup>10</sup> If we claim we have not sinned, we make him out to be a liar and his word is not in us." This by itself does not constitute a confession. I will examine one of the confessions in the Lutheran Book of Worship (LBW). Keeping in mind, we have multiple resources for confessions, Evangelical Book of Worship (ELW), Sundays and Seasons and anyone can write their own confession, as long as the necessary pieces of the confession. What is necessary for a confession of sins?

In the confession of sins, we must admit that we have sinned and the guilt of the sin. When we say that we are in need of God, for what we have done, we admit the guilt of sin. We also must release our ability of correcting the sin, and place that responsibility upon God.

In Psalm 51, we can hear the Psalmist confess that he sinned, and the guilt of the sin.

<sup>1</sup> Have mercy on me, O God, according to your unfailing love; according to your great compassion blot out my transgressions. <sup>2</sup> Wash away all my iniquity and cleanse me from my sin. <sup>3</sup> For I know my transgressions, and my sin is always before me. <sup>4</sup> Against you, you only, have I sinned and done what is evil in your sight;

It is in verse 14 that the psalmist admits that he cannot free himself, but only God can, of the sins, and in response to what God does, the psalmist is repentant and promises to change.

"<sup>14</sup> Deliver me from the guilt of bloodshed, O God, you who are God my Savior, and my tongue will sing of your righteousness."

Now, to the confession from the LBW,

(P) In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

#### (C) Amen

(P) Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you and worthily magnify your holy name, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

#### (C) Amen

(P) If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. But if we confess our sins, God who is faithful and just will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

#### Silence for reflection and self-examination.

(P) Most merciful God,

(C) we confess that we are in bondage to sin and cannot free ourselves. We have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors (C) Almighty and merciful God as ourselves. (C) Almighty and merciful God grant you healing, pardon,

(C) For the sake of your Son, Jesus Christ, have mercy on us. Forgive us, renew us, and lead us, so that we may delight in your will and walk in your ways, to the glory of your holy name. Amen

(P) Almighty God, in his mercy, has given his Son to die for us and, for his sake, forgives us all our sins.

(P) As a called and ordained minister of the Church of Christ, and by his authority, I therefore declare to you the entire forgiveness of all your sins, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

#### (C) Amen

The only part of this confession that comes from the Bible is the small section from 1 John. Is it biblically based? Yes, it is. However, the Psalm comes directly from the Bible, where the LBW confession, only one portion comes from the Bible. Does it contain the necessary admittance of the sin and the guilt of the sin, yes it does. Does it place the responsibility of the release of sins on God and not self, yes.

Below is another example that is biblically based and fits the mentioned requirements. It does not have a direct piece of scripture but fits all the needs of a confession. This one is an example of a confession from the Sundays and Seasons resource for worship. In fact, each of the confessions taken from the LBW, ELW or Sundays and Seasons all fit the necessary requirements for a confession.

(P) I confess to God Almighty,
before the whole company of heaven,
and to you, my brothers and sisters,
that I have sinned by my own fault
in thought, word, and deed.
I pray God Almighty to have mercy on me,
forgive me all my sins,
and bring me to everlasting life.

Almighty and merciful God grant you healing, pardon, and forgiveness of all your sins. Amen. I confess to God Almighty, before the whole company of heaven, and to you, my brothers and sisters, that I have sinned by my own fault in thought, word, and deed. I pray God Almighty to have mercy on me, forgive me all my sins, and bring me to everlasting life.

(P) Almighty and merciful God

grant you healing, pardon, and forgiveness of all your sins.

#### (C) Amen.

Why one confession over another? It comes down to liturgy. Simply, it is the order of worship. But it is much more than that. From the Merriam-Webster Collegiate Dictionary;

liturgy \'li-tər-jē\ noun

plural **-gies** [Late Latin *liturgia*, from Greek *leitourgia* public service, from Greek (Attic) *leïton* public building (from Greek *laos*—Attic *leōs* people) + *-ourgia* -urgy] 1560

- 1: *often capitalized*: a eucharistic rite
- **2:** a rite or body of rites prescribed for public worship
- **3:** a customary repertoire of ideas, phrases, or observances

Many church bodies use a lectionary for the readings and seasons of the church. We use a three-year lectionary most of the time. Readings are selected based upon the season of the church year. I have used sermon themes that also tie to each other and look to bring out a theme for that time of the sermon. During the sermon series and using the Sundays and Seasons, the third part of the definition of liturgy is emphasized to bring a common flow of ideas to the worship service.

Sundays and Seasons provides music suggestions based upon the church year. The confession matches with the church year and the readings. Ideas for the sermon are given to tie the season, music, confession and readings. By changing things up during worship, keeping the same format of worship, pushes us to grow as Christians. We can look for a greater understanding of God's Adam Durant-June 9 activity in the world. If we are comfortable during worship, then we are most likely not growing. God does not call us to live in comfortability, but to live in discipleship. Disciples live as followers of Jesus Christ, which is to stand and confess the truths of our faith. In order to do that, we need to grow into a faith that can be prepared to provide truths to everyone we encounter.

## The Church's Real Job

At least for Luke – and I believe for us – we cannot talk about sin without the offer of forgiveness. Robert Capon in *Hunting the Divine Fox* – *Images and Mystery in Christian Faith*, points out the church's real job:

"The church is not in the morals business. The world is in the morals business, quite rightfully; and it has done a fine job of it, all things considered. The history of the world's moral codes is a monument to the labors of many philosophers, and it is a monument of striking unity and beauty. As C.S. Lewis said, anyone who thinks the moral codes of mankind are all different should be locked up in a library and be made to read three days' worth of them. He would be bored silly by the sheer sameness.

"What the world cannot get right, however, is the *forgiveness business* – and that, of course, *is the church's real job*. She is in the world to deal with the Sin which the world can't turn off or escape and avoid evil. She is in the business of offering, to a world which knows all about that tiresome subject, forgiveness for its chronic unwillingness to take its own advice. But the minute she even hints that morals, and not forgiveness, is the name

of her game, she instantly corrupts the Gospel and runs headlong into blatant nonsense.

"The church becomes, not Ms. Forgiven Sinner, but Ms. Right. Christianity becomes the good guys in here versus the bad guys out there. Which, of course, is pure tripe. *The church is nothing but the world under the sign of baptism.*" [pp. 132-133]

## The 11th Commandment

# JOHN 13:31-35 "A Mission of Love"... for "a God of Love..."

It's the last night before Jesus goes to Calvary... One of his disciples, Judas, has just left to put the wheels of betrayal into motion as Jesus remains with the other eleven... Now, this last night with them, during these last few precious moments, Jesus turns to them and says, *"let's talk"*.

He says that he has glorified God... and *now* he is about to be glorified by God... He tells them that he must go on a journey that they will not be able to go on with him... It's a journey he must make alone... He tells them that, before he leaves on this last night of his life, he must give them something that will guide them on their own subsequent journeys, *a new commandment*.

It's one of the last teachings he will give them... this new commandment, one to be honored and kept... It has 3 simple words..."Love one another."

At the very beginning of Jewish history God gave *Moses* the Ten Commandments... Commandments to *serve as the foundation* for all Israel... the foundation of how to honor God and live together.

As he was given the 10 Commandments, Moses was given one of the highest places in Jewish history as he became known as "*the lawgiver*."

Now in giving this "*new commandment*," Jesus places himself above Moses as *the "new lawgiver"* as this new commandment from God through him in effect becomes the 11<sup>th</sup> Commandment...

As God first gave the 10 Commandments they were given to *Moses* as *"Israel's leader"*... This 11<sup>th</sup> Commandment is now given by *Jesus, God in the flesh,* to the disciples... the *"soon-to-be leaders"* of God's mission to the world.

Along with the 10 Commandments came a promise to the nation of Israel from God... if they were faithfully kept God would treasure the people of Israel as God's nation and they would become a holy nation and a kingdom of priests (Exod. 19:5-6).

*Now Jesus' promise* to the disciples is that if they would faithfully keep this commandment all people would know that they were his disciples.

They each had their own response in receiving... and it resulted in faith communities responding by getting *sidetracked*... *The Israelites*', responding in humanness and lack of understanding, became impatient and frustrated to the point they set out to make another god... (*Exod. 32*)

*The disciples* also respond by *getting sidetracked…* and they too missed the point… *Peter*, for instance focused not on the *"giving of the New Commandment"*, but on the earlier statement about Jesus going on a journey that they couldn't follow.

**Getting sidetracked** has become a recurring pattern for Christian communities throughout the ages... Throughout history, we as Christians have found ourselves, not only disagreeing... but in "war" with each other... to the point of actually killing one another instead of "loving one anther"...! Can you imagine a community of faith getting so sidetracked that they literally go after one another...! It's about "me"! It's about what "I" want...! I'm the one that's got it right! **(The Church's Real Job"...)** 

A church in community as the family of God... I often wonder how the world sees faith communities living out the 11<sup>th</sup> Commandment.

From the beginning the Jews lived and died by the 10 Commandments... I can't help but wonder

why the Christian communities today don't, in that same faithfulness, live and die by *the* 11<sup>th</sup> *Commandment*.

I just can't understand it as being any less binding now... or any less important now... It was given by God through Jesus the Christ to be *the sign* to the world that Christians are God's people... the people of God's kingdom destined to take God's mission to the world... **"A Mission of Love"... for "A God of Love..."** 

These simple and brief words of Jesus... "Love one another" ... make up the 11<sup>th</sup> Commandment... and just as simple and brief are Jesus' instructions on how to carry out what seems to be so simple for our lives... "As I have loved you, you also should love one another". Jesus tells the disciples, all of us... all of the world... "Just do as I did to you."

It's interesting to note as Jesus gave this new commandment, its focus was for the disciples *first* to be about *loving disciples*... then for Christians to be about *loving Christians*... then to be about Christians being about *loving the world in general*... Reality is that the church, a community of faith, cannot effectively reach out with the Gospel for very long if all who are a part of the community in totality can't love one another first... It just can't do it.

Jesus gave the disciples and each of us *the great*est example of love that the world could ever be given.

#### He did it through Sacrifice...

Jesus loved the disciples so much that he willingly made sacrifices for them... He sacrificed his *time*... he sacrificed his *energy*... his *emotions*... his *schedule*... his *family*... his *privacy*... even his *life*.

For each of us to live the 11<sup>th</sup> Commandment and love one another, ours also then is sacrifice for one another.

It's about sacrificing *time*... sacrificing our *energy*... *emotions*... *schedules*... *families*... *privacy*... and yes... maybe even *our lives* for one another.

Sacrifices come about in our lives as we become serious about visiting the sick or hurting... helping others with a problem... responding when called on in an emergency... or in simply "being with", listening and embracing each other in our life journey... Getting rid of "I wants", and focusing on "God wants..." (How I enter into a transitional or intentional interim...)

The call to *love one another*... the call to sacrifice for one another... it's for everyone... for all of us.

#### He did it though Sharing...

Jesus expressed his *love* for the disciples by *sharing himself* with them... He *listened* to their fears... he *cried* in their pain... he *laughed* in their joy... He *prayed* with them and for them... He *gently showed* them their sin and brokenness and *helped* them back onto the right path... *He shared* who he was with them as he opened himself up to them, *fully giving*.

As God's people living out the 11<sup>th</sup> Commandment "loving one another" is about sharing ourselves with one another... it's about sharing others' pain and laughter... gently pointing out faults and gently forgiving... seeking forgiveness when wrong... and opening up ourselves to others... It's about "being with"... being genuine... being real... It's called being "authentic"... "Being with" is one of the greatest compliments a faith community can ever receive.

All this is found in *times of comforting*... in *celebrating*... in *confessing and forgiving*... in *privately going to another to express concerns* about the way they are living... and in *accepting another* as another comes to us expressing concerns about the way we are living.

#### Jesus did it through Serving...

Jesus loved the disciples by *serving them*... He called them to follow him... he became their mas-

ter and teacher... and then proceeded to serve them. A few verses before the reading in this 13<sup>th</sup> chapter of John, John shared the story of Jesus, the very Son of God, washing the disciples' feet.

To live out the 11<sup>th</sup> Commandment and *"love one another"*, is about *serving one another...* It's about *remembering* that no matter who we are, we are never too good or too mighty... too important or too wealthy... too educated... or too old or too young... to serve anyone... If the Son of God can serve people of all kinds... then so can we!

"Love one another as Jesus loves"... it's about sacrificing for one another... sharing ourselves with one another... it's about serving one another.

Ya know... situations are no different in our times as they were when Jesus actually walked this earth... oh, maybe the details and the names are different... but in general it's the same.

Today in this world... there is *need for sacrifice*... there is *need for sharing*... there is *need for serving*... There is a need to get ourselves out of the way and let God be God... and let the Spirit in... and let the Spirit lead! There are opportunities each and every day in the life that God sets before each of us, for the good of all, in God's mission to the world.

Each time that I prepare to wrap up an intentional or transitional interim and head out to where God is calling next... I go inviting the people, the community of faith, to trust themselves... and to trust their instincts to do the right thing.

The only intrinsic right for a "church" to exist is because God is here... Not that I am here... not that you are here... but, because God is here... God has been with you... and is with you... and always will be... Remember that... God is with you... teaching, guiding, loving, and encouraging...! **The call...** it's to follow the example that Jesus set.

Believe in Jesus... and continue to work on being and growing... in "being, being the church... the loving people" of the God of Love. The Church, the community of faith, is "A Mission of Love"... for "a God of Love..."

The Commandments... they serve as the foundation.

This last night with his disciples, during these last few precious moments together Jesus turned to them, people just like you and I, and said, *"let's talk"*.

<sup>34</sup>I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. <sup>35</sup>By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, **if**, **if** you have love for one another."
